SOTA RELEASES 2015 IB EXAMINATION RESULTS

The 2015 cohort from the School of the Arts (SOTA) will collect their International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) and IB Career-related Programme (IBCP) results from the school at 2pm today.

Diverse Articulation Pathways

- 2 Singapore's first batch of 22 International Baccalaureate Career-related Programme (IBCP) students is graduating and several of them will be pursuing their artistic passions at renowned local and international art institutions and conservatories.
- They have been offered places with the following institutions: Yong Siew Toh Conservatory of Music (Singapore); Royal Conservatoire of Scotland (UK); Royal Central School of Speech and Drama (UK); Central School of Ballet (UK); Rambert School of Ballet and Contemporary Dance (UK); John Cranko School (Germany); London Contemporary Dance School (UK); New Zealand School of Dance (New Zealand); East 15 Acting School (UK); Queensland Ballet (Australia).
- "As Singapore's only pre-tertiary institution specialising in the arts, SOTA believes it can play an important role in the nurturing and development of the next generation of artists. We envisioned the IBCP as a bridge for students to gain a taste of and prepare them for conservatory life. We are heartened that many from our IBCP pioneer batch have been offered places in prestigious arts institutions and we are confident that SOTA is heading towards the right direction in grooming the next generation of professional artists for the local arts scene," said Ms Lim Geok Cheng, Principal, SOTA.
- A total of 155 students sat for the IB examinations in 2015 and SOTA achieved a 100% pass rate in both the IBDP and IBCP. SOTA's IBDP students scored 38.2 points on average, with 50 of them obtaining a score of between 40 45 points. 73% of the IBCP students achieved excellent performance in their career-related studies and in their DP subjects, scoring Grades 6 and 7.
- Started in 2008, SOTA has produced three batches of graduates. Many of them have gone to where their passion leads them, charting diverse pathways and pursuing their studies in various fields such as the Arts, Sciences, Engineering, Law, Medicine and more.

"The arts education in SOTA not only focus on the technicalities but also the thinking involved that can be adapted and translated into other cultural scenarios. Some of us may not pursue the artistic route, however we are still grounded in the appreciation of art and I feel that this will be a positive impact on society," said Hans Chew, graduating Visual Arts student.

The IB Career-related Programme (IBCP) is an innovative education framework for students aged 16 to 19 incorporating the vision and educational principles of the IB into a unique programme specifically tailored for students who wish to engage in career-related learning.

IBCP students engage with a challenging programme of study that genuinely interests them while gaining transferable and lifelong skills in applied knowledge, critical thinking, communication, and cross-cultural engagement. They are well prepared to succeed at institutions of higher learning. The IBCP enables students to:

- Develop a broad range of career-related competencies and to deepen their understanding in general areas of knowledge
- Prepare for effective participation in an ever-changing world of work
- Foster the attributes of the learner profile allowing students to become true lifelong learners willing to consider new perspectives
- Engage in learning that makes a positive difference to future lives
- Become a self confident person ready for life in the 21st century.

During the IBCP years in Year 5 and 6, students are required to fulfill four core requirements of the IBCP, which include Approaches to Learning, Reflective Project, Language Development, and Community and Service. They will also be required to take at least two Diploma subjects that includes the compulsory Arts Subject at a Higher Level and Language B (Mother - Tongue Language) at the Standard Level. Students have the option of taking a third Diploma subject in Individuals and Societies at either the Higher or Standard Level. In the Career-related Study component, the students are required to complete three modules in their respective art forms. These modules cater specifically to the development for strong artistic fundamentals.

About the IB Diploma Programme

The IB Diploma Programme (DP) is an academically challenging and balanced programme of education with final examinations that prepares students, aged 16 to 19, for success at university and life beyond. The programme is presented as six academic areas with a central, three-component core. It encourages the concurrent study of a broad range of academic areas. Diploma Programme students study two modern languages (or a modern language and a classical language), a humanities or social science subject, an experimental science, mathematics and either one of the creative arts or another science or social science subject.

In addition to these subjects, all Diploma Programme students complete three core requirements that are included to challenge and to broaden the educational experience:

- The extended essay (4,000 words) which requires independent research related to a Diploma Programme subject
- Theory of knowledge that encompasses 1) critically examining different ways
 of knowing perception, emotion, language and reason and 2) examining the
 different kinds of knowledge scientific, artistic, mathematical and historical
- Creativity, action, service (CAS) that requires students to engage in 1) arts
 activities and demonstrating creativity, 2) taking action by participating in
 sports (team and individual), local and international projects and expeditions
 and 3) participating in community and social service activities. Students are
 expected to be involved in CAS activities for the equivalent of at least three
 hours each week during the two years of the programme.
